



7 QUESTIONS WITH THE VERY REVEREND SHELLEY-ANN TENIA

1. What is your biggest fear?

Seeing God face to face and not being able to give an account of my stewardship especially when I'm asked about taking care of my soul and the gifts I received.

2. What makes you laugh the most?

Playing, games with my family, with children, outside games, in the rain, and a good joke.

3. What is your favorite game or sport to watch and play?

Dance and all related sports (gymnastics, ice skating etc). Swimming and volleyball/basketball are close seconds.

4. Which would you rather do: wash dishes, clean the bathroom, or clean the house? Clean the house. That can be quite cathartic, allows for creative expression, and for healthy use of energy.

5. How do you describe your personal theology?

Incarnational and Sacramental. God got into the messiness and made God's goodness known and accessible in the person of Jesus the Christ. Because of him I have an outward sign of my union with God and a pure witness of another way to be fully human. The transformative power of loving presence and witness.

6. What is important to you in a church?

That the people have encountered God in Jesus Christ and know their need for God and their beloved goodness. That they continue to encounter God and trust the work of the Holy Spirit. That the faithful are committed to being Church – ecclesia a people called out and sent in love, for love, with love, to witness to love, to make a difference through love, to serve in the name of love.

7. What are some ways that you think we could make our church more welcoming for new visitors? Make no assumptions or judgments about what we see but see Christ in them first and as fellow humans on a journey.

Be kind guides – pay attention, answer questions, share, be genuinely interested in the person (their lives, their concerns, their family, their hopes).

Witness and Testify - Share what is good about your relationship with Jesus, how you encounter God in this community of faith, why being connected has been a blessing to you and your family. Be real.

Upon her resignation the Chairperson position was given to Mrs. Joan Charles who started to serve from then to present.

TRINITY JUNIOR SCHOOL'S RESPONSE TO COVID-19

Here at Trinity Junior School, we have become fully acquainted with online learning. Our experiences of April, May and June 2020 have served as teachable moments for us. If events demand that we close the physical school plant and conduct classes online once more, we believe that we are equal to the task. We envisage each student in uniform, seated at his or her kitchen table, equipped with a laptop or desktop computer, printer, stable internet connection, and adult supervision. We envisage each student, ready every day to receive and participate in instruction, and eager to ask as well as answer questions. We see parents as equal partners in this experience, completely prepared to do much more than they might have, previously. For it is when home and school are on the same page that learning becomes both meaningful and memorable.



SOCIAL OUTREACH

THE ST. CLARE (OXFORD STREET) HOME BY ELIZABETH SAMUEL-HOWE

The Oxford Street (St Clare) Home (OSSCH) located at 103 Oxford Street, Port of Spain is another of several outreach ministries of the Cathedral Church of the Holy Trinity. The home was established in the 1980's to provide caregiving to elderly adults in and around the community. The average age-group of residents is over fifty-five (55) years of age. To date the home has provided assistive care living to over 100 residents.

The Oxford Street Home is owned by the Anglican Diocese of Trinidad and Tobago and directed by a Board of Directors which was formed under the auspices of the Holy Trinity Cathedral. The day to day affairs of the home are managed by a Matron, along with a complement staff of twelve (12) members, which includes one senior caregiver, six permanent caregivers, five-part time caregivers and a handyman.

The Oxford Street Home is a three (3) story building which includes an office, kitchen, dining room, sitting/TV room and nineteen (19) resident rooms. It has the capacity to accommodate twenty-nine (29) residents but currently has eleven (11) residents which is less than 50% occupancy. The current monthly rate is \$4,500 per resident.

The home allows for independent living with housing arrangement designed exclusively for older adults. It offers both single and double occupancy rooms. While residents live independently, they are afforded amenities, activities, and services on site to connect with peers and participate in community activities, such as arts and crafts, field trips and acts of worship and fellowship. Additionally, residents are also provided with daily meals, and basic housekeeping and laundry services.

The Cathedral Church of the Holy Trinity aims to provide through the OSSCH, comfortable and affordable residential care for the aged in a Christian environment operating as a "Home away from Home". All caregivers are trained in the care of the elderly with the necessary nursing skills.



DID YOU KNOW?

Trinity Cathedral established its first Society in March 1837 to assist those afflicted with sickness or other misfortunes.

ONLINE WORSHIP AT THE HOLY TRINITY CATHEDRAL BY JUDITH CLARK

What a difference a day can make! That day for me was Saturday March 14th, 2020, when my church life changed forever!

I am a Math middle school teacher in Florida and on Friday March 13th I went to school to finalize 3rd quarter grades for my students. I said a prayer as I was leaving, not knowing when or if I'd be back after Spring Break Stay-cation. We were in the midst of the COVID-19 worldwide pandemic and we had no idea how this school year would finish and how a new one would begin.

I was scrolling through Facebook and saw the Dean of the Holy Trinity Cathedral in the diocese of Trinidad and Tobago, Rev. Shelley beginning "ah live". I jumped on for Evening Prayer and later for Compline – night prayer. Rev. invited us to join her for Morning Prayer in our pajamas and to "keep the hours with her". She reminded us that the church is its people, not the building, and worship will continue online. The hours turned out to be worship 4 times a day – Morning Prayer at 6.30am; Midday Prayer at 12 noon; Evening Prayer at 6pm and Compline at 9pm.

I was raised in the Anglican church at All Saints in Trinidad and joined the Episcopal Church here in the US. However, I never went to church four times in a day. I took the leap of faith with Rev. Shelley and what I received that 1st week was amazing grace! Rev. Shelley prayed; read God's word; sang like an angel and delivered some of the best reflections/messages that I had ever heard. Rev. is a faithful Woman of God, but now she can add tech guru to the many hats that she wears. The numbers kept rising as more worshipers jumped onto the live broadcast - God's movement was just beginning. I really loved this worship!

Bishop Claude joined the online movement and I really valued his knowledge and teachings of God's word. I think that Bishop enjoyed interacting with us online – feedback was immediate.

Bible study and "Know Your Faith" series switched from Facebook Live to Zoom. We spent hours engrossed in learning about our spiritual gifts and fruits, Nehemiah and the Book of Common Prayer. I truly gained a deeper understanding of my faith and all the different aspects of the Anglican way of life.

My little godson watched Rev. Shelley and Bishop Claude and asked questions. So one Sunday he wanted to do "ah live". He set up school with our 2 cats, his stuffed animals and action figures. He read to them from his children's Bible and gave them green stars for good behavior.

Special thanks to the Very Rev. Dr. Shelley-Ann Tenia, Candice Marks, Catherine Vergil, Dr. Phaedra Pierre and Bishop Claude. It is not easy to go live. May God continue to bless you all!

I ask everybody that has benefited from online worship to give of yourself – grocery items, clothes, finances. Remember what our Dean says, "Prayer and presence are just as important as Crix and corn-beef!"
